FINLAND AND MEXICO

The Good Humanitarian Donorship (GHD) initiative facilitates collective advancement of GHD principles and good practices. The Good Humanitarian Donorship Initiative strives to increase effectiveness, efficiency and accountability of donors' humanitarian action by promoting the 23 GHD principles on the international humanitarian agenda and by vigorously working for their implementation.

In particular, GHDI pursues its mission through:

the development and dissemination of evidence-based best practice of donor behaviour; support to the development of peer-to-peer monitoring mechanisms of members' implementation of GHD principles; outreach to partners – state and non-state - outside GHDI;

ensuring that the GHD principles are used as a point of departure for and reflected in international discussions and decisions on humanitarian actions, strategies and policies as well as enriching practice in field operations.¹

Main themes for 2013 - 2014:

- 1. Enhancing implementation and aid quality/effectiveness through standards
- 2. Public-Private Partnerships
- 3. Contribution of the GHD to the Humanitarian Summit

As several of the work-streams included in this plan are building on processes and outcomes from previous work-plans and as it is likely that many on-going activities will continue beyond 2013/14, this is considered an agreed rolling work-plan which will act as a framework for the coming year.
